
The Munya Movement.

Campaigns for Unions, Campaigns for you

Student campaigning needs to evolve with modern society; that's why I will ensure we have a new, flexible democratic approach to the delivery of campaigns. Protesting out on the streets of Westminster is one positive tactic of several; the NUS also needs to be responsive to those students for whom this method is inaccessible. You might be fighting for Wednesday afternoons to be free, or cuts to welfare provision on and off campus, or accommodation standards, or the local bus service – whatever it is, if it is important to your students then it needs to be important to the NUS as well.

I will develop a universal campaigns advice pack that informs unions of how to deliver effective campaigns using their own mechanisms of governance and how these campaigns can be communicated in new, creative and effective ways using the latest technology and trends.

Healthy students, healthy minds

Unprecedented numbers of students are today struggling with their mental wellbeing. I have seen first-hand the effects of mental health problems in my University as well as in my own life and I can only see these problems getting worse unless we continue to push for more help and resources. Too often this problem is fobbed off on NHS provided services that are struggling to cope. I will make sure Universities do more to further embed the wellbeing of students into the heart of the education system.



I want to enable more staff in recognising the problems early and provide help and guidance where it's needed most. Student unions are at the forefront of this battle and they need the right support to force a cultural shift within their institutions and fight for a wellbeing environment that their members need.

I will champion the 'Healthy Universities' initiative that puts wellbeing at the core of university strategies, I will also champion its expansion so that all education institutions both HE and FE can be a part of something designed to make the student experience better.

I will undertake research to determine what the basic level of student support should look like in an ever evolving environment.

3. Pushing Prevent off Campus

Our government has resorted to fighting their so-called 'War on Terrorism' not only with missiles and mass surveillance, but by making our students easy targets to make middle England feel comfortable at night. While claiming that 'our way of life must not be altered by ISIS' the government are systematically turning our country into a place where academics are recruited as state sponsored spies and files are kept on seditious suspects. Project Fear is alive and well and the scapegoats are students. If we really do believe that we must not let terrorists change our way of life, then we must resist this new culture of fear and suspicion on campuses. I will make sure Students unions are at the core of protecting the rights and freedoms of students and of wider society, we must resist this initiative with our collective might.

I will continue the lobbying of government and our institutions against Prevent and ensure that all student unions can confidently communicate the impact of Prevent to their student body.

I will work with students' unions to help them mobilisee student societies so we tackle Prevent at all levels.

Scraping by

It has never been easy living on a student budget, it was never supposed to be — but the national housing crisis combined with the removal of student number caps has now put unbearable pressure on student living costs and the quantity of accommodation available. Student Unions are witnessing first-hand how education, an experience that is supposed to transform individuals into better versions of themselves, is devolving into a nightmare, one that many students would discourage others from undertaking. To make the experience of being a student one worth a recommendation, I will push for more provision of affordable student housing across the UK. We are living in a time where Landlords are treating students with contempt, and alongside this institutions are treating students as little more than piggy banks that they can shake whenever they want more money, while offering little to no support. This brazen exploitation of those with the least ability to pay must end now.

I will campaign for rent caps for student accommodation.
